

Legislative Team Update

Greetings CBH/SAA friends and family!

I hope you are all enjoying the spring weather and taking advantage of the many opportunities to shoot archery at your local clubs and participate in various tournaments across the state! I'm excited for the State Broadhead in Lodi and look forward to visiting Lodi Archers for the first time.

Just a couple quick Legislative and Fish and Game Commission (FGC) Updates to share this month:

- SB 8 Firearms: Liability (as amended) would require a
 firearm owner to maintain a gun liability insurance
 policy covering losses or damages resulting from any
 negligent or accidental use of that firearm. SB 8 was
 pulled from the April 26 Senate Judiciary Committee
 agenda reportedly because the committee chair was a
 "no" vote. This is a great victory, but the bill isn't dead
 yet... SB 8 is now a "two-year" bill.
- At the December 2022 Commission meeting, DFW brought forward a recommendation that the big horn sheep tag quota for the general lottery in the Marble/ Clipper Mountains be decreased from 5 tags to 1 tag and the 1 fundraising tag for the Marble, Clipper, and South Bristol Mountains be eliminated. CBH/SAA and our partners in the CHCC supported a reduction in tags based on the population concerns in the Marble/ Clippers but took issue with DFW's extreme recommended reduction of tags (e.g., the extreme reduction was not scientifically justifiable). Following various meetings with CDFW and public testimony at the December 2022 and February 2023 FGC meetings, CDFW revised their recommendation at the April 2023 meeting to include 1 general tag for the Marble/ Clipper Mountains hunt zone and to restore the 1 Marble/Clipper/South Bristol Mountains fundraising.
- The April 2023 FGC meeting also served as the final adoption hearing for elk tag allocations based on management objectives established in the 2018 Elk Conservation and Management Plan. n general, these increased hunting opportunities are exciting wins for elk hunters in California and CBH/SAA received commitments from CDFW staff to ensure a portion of next year's tags are allocated to archers! As noted in previous newsletter updates, CDFW recommended establishment of the new Tehachapi Rocky Mountain Elk Hunt zone with a a total of 25 bull tags and 25

antlerless tags, with 20 of the bull and 15 of the antlerless assigned to the SHARE Program. CDFW also recommended an increase in antlerless harvest by 10 tags and shifting the bull season to a later hunt period within the Siskiyou Roosevelt Elk Hunt Zone. Similarly, in the Northwestern Roosevelt Elk Hunt Zone, CDFW recommended increasing public bull harvest by 22 tags in this hunt zone to reduce population density, reduce human-elk conflict and disease transmission, and to help attain desired bull/cow the sex ratio objectives. Finally, CDFW also recommended adjustments to the La Panza Tule Elk Hunt Zone and Central Coast Tule Elk Management Unit including the creation of a new Gabilan Tule Elk Hunt Zone. The Bear Valley and Cache Creek Tule Elk Hunt Zones also saw some boundary modifications. Be sure to check out these hunts during the Big Game Draw and SHARE Hunt Draws! Best of luck!

Reminder: Whether you've been involved in archery or hunting your whole life, or are new to this sport, you have something of value to add to the conversation and I encourage you to reach out to me and the CBH Legislative team and share your knowledge and experience! We look forward to hearing from you soon!

Rescued

On Friday, before the 27th Annual Tilapia Tournament in May, I headed to Palo Verde from my home in Arizona. As I arrived in Blythe, Karen Keating, the Immediate Past 2nd VP of Target called. We decided to meet in Palo Verde to reestablish the trail into my favorite tilapia hotspot. Upon arrival my excitement and expectation of a good productive bowfishing weekend took a dive! Where I normally park my truck I found a huge excavator. It appeared as though they had been using it to work on an large irrigation pipe which had been leaking for many years. Their work was a mere 50 yards downstream from my tilapia hotspot and I was concerned that their digging had disrupted the normal migration of tilapia into their spawning area where we would be waiting come Saturday morning.

Against my better judgment I decided we would go ahead and prepare the area for Saturday morning. Karen's help was invaluable! I used an ax, snippers, and a saw to cut our way down to the water. As I hacked the brush Karen cut it into smaller pieces and stashed it out of the way as we went. If she had not been there to help it would have taken me six hours instead of three hours to get it all done!! So a big thank you Karen!!

Kat Green, a newcomer not only to bowfishing, but to the world of archery, was excitedly looking forward to Karen looked back across the inlet and said "Hey. shooting her first tilapia and carp. She had never shot a bow before but was excited about the experience. Because my tilapia hotspot offered close shots at tilapia, I offered to take her and Karen with me.

Saturday was a bust for tilapia. We saw a few small fish and took a few shots but no hits. There were some bigger tilapia sitting on nests but they were out of bow range. Around 1:00 p.m. I decided it was time to cut our losses and to go to another location to see if our luck would change. We drove past the excavator again heading back to Palo verde.

When we got back to town it was 102° with no shade. The heat proved be too much for the ladies as they chose to stay in the air-conditioned truck while I looked for tilapia. Still we ended up with nothing!!

Day two, Karen and I returned to the hotspot and again there were no tilapia migrating, another bust.



At noon we decided to head back to Palo Verde so we got in my truck and drove past the excavator again, and around the bend to the turnaround. We came back the same way we had came passing the bend and the excavator. We decided to give it one last shot and check out the other side of the inlet. before we left the area. When we arrived, we heard an unusual sucking noise coming from where we iust were on the other side.

When I first saw the burro, I thought it was laying in the mud to get cool. Then I realized it was struggling too get up because it was belly deep in mud.

Rescued, continued from page 5 - I don't know how many times we drove past this poor beast, and I don't know how long he had been there. If we hadn't decided to cross to the opposite side of the inlet we would have never seen him. I'm sure he would have died of dehydration or have been eaten alive by the coyotes that had left tracks in the soft dirt on both sides of the inlet. We drove back to the other side and I got a shovel from my truck. As I approach this magnificent beast I talked to him calmly and told him, "You're okay. You're safe Buddy. We'll get you out of here. It's going to be okay."



As I began to dig mud away from his back legs he turned his head and looked at me. I let him smell my hand and I petted his head, neck and back. While I worked, I continued talking to him and presented my hand to him to smell each time he turned his head to look at me. He remained very calm but I knew he was exhausted and thirsty from struggling to get out of the mud. He had even tried to lift himself out of the mud by slamming his muzzle down but all he did was beat a depression in the mud.

Karen brought me two bottles of water and I cut a pin hole in the caps so I could squirt water into his mouth. He liked that for sure but it was not as much as he needed.

After an hour of fighting with the sticky mud I realized I had to figure something else out. I decided that pulling him out was going to be the best option. I dug a hole with my hand down along his side and under his brisket. Then I reached under him and grabbed the loose end of a 3" ratchet strap that Karen got from my truck and formed a loop that was big enough to fall off once the burro was freed.

My biggest concern was to position the straps so that its legs wouldn't be injured. I gave Karen instructions on how to gently pull him out of the mud with the truck. She was extremely anxious and nervous about being in control of pulling this awesome beast out of the mud with the truck.

Slowly moving the truck forward, the straps tightened and he started to emerge. The burro finally escaped the muddy prison and the strap pulled over his head and dropped to the ground. This is what I hoped would happen.

He was free but weak and wobbly as he walked up the embankment. When he got to the top of the bank he looked back at us as if to say, "thank you." We watched him until we couldn't seem anymore which was about half of a mile down the road.



This was the first time I had ever been that close to wild burro and I was shocked at how big he was. Looking at the pictures you can see how small I look in comparison. I weigh 260 pounds and I swear his head was as big as my torso! He was a healthy male known as a "jack." They typically weigh around 500 pounds and are smaller compared to horses.

Afterwards, we kept talking about how many time we must have passed the burro, and didn't see him as he was camouflaged in the mud. Had Karen not heard the strange sound he may have met his demise. Karen and I didn't get a tilapia or carp, but we did rescue the biggest burro!

Thanks to Karen for all of her help and for doing such a great job of driving the truck, and supporting the rescue efforts!! All in all it was a great weekend.

Integrity in Archery Karen Keating

Most archers are honest and truthful in regard to competition. I've seen archers forget to reset their pins when shooting freestyle. Consequently, they missed the target. I've seen archers use the wrong pin when shooting bowhunter freestyle and miss the target. In each of these cases, the archer took the zero(s) for their score for those arrows. Trust me, that hurts a lot. The frustration you feel is immense, knowing that your mistake may have cost you a medal. Being an archer with integrity means you take that zero because the rules of play demand it.

Integrity is the practice of being honest and showing a consistent and uncompromising adherence to strong moral and ethical principles and values. In ethics, integrity is regarded as the honesty and truthfulness or accuracy of one's actions (According to Wikipedia). C.S. Lewis wrote, "Integrity is doing the right thing even when no one is watching." Integrity in archery is comprised of the following concepts:

· Fair Play: a virtue of rule adherence whereby players and athletes abide by the rules of competition (Olympics definition)

Respect for the game

Sportsmanship

Honesty in following the rules

Have you ever gone to a tournament and witnessed a lack of integrity while competing? Have you heard stories of archers cheating or bending the rules so that they receive a higher score?

When cheating happens in archery, our sport suffers. I've known archers who refuse to shoot with people who have the reputation of being cheaters. Others choose to shoot with those that are known cheaters so that they can hold them to the rules. I've known archers who vow never to shoot in another State Tournament because of the cheating that has occurred at these events. I've heard that some archers take both of their scorecards and alter their score so that they become the winner. So what can you do to preserve the integrity of archery? In the CBH/SAA bylaws, under each "General Working Mechanics" of State Tournaments, there is a section on how to "protest" an archer if they have not followed the rules of the tournament. Here is what it says:

"11. PROTESTS:

a. Protest fees will be set at \$50 for each protest. A protest may be filed at any time during the tournament and within 1/2 hour after last call for scorecards. The appointed representative shall rule on the protests. If the protest is successful, then the protest fee will be refunded. Unsuccessful protest fees will not be refunded."

Most archers, when you mention a rule infraction, will do the right thing and take the zero(s) for that arrow(s). All archers, and especially CBH/SAA officers, have a duty to uphold the rules of the State Tournaments. To allow your friends to "take a pass and reshoot" if they forgot to reset their sight is definitely behavior unbecoming of an officer or anyone.

Integrity takes a lifetime to cultivate but can be lost in a moment.

Longbow...Long Beard Rodney York

A chill ran down my spine as I sat nestled against the 50" trunk of the towering Ponderosa Pine. Thoughts of the 4:00 a.m. quickly gulped coffee brought temporary relief. But then the shivers returned as impressions of the late February; 3 foot snows paralyzed my mind. Consequently, Spring had arrived late while 30 degree mornings lingered on throughout the present week. There had been much devastation left from the storms so intense cleanup was mandated. Many days cutting trees and cleaning branches had been used up. The smaller limbs were gathered, hauled to a safe area and burned. This had been exhausting work and seemed endless. However I had learned these "work outs" were extremely beneficial. The repetition of this exercise tends to get one in shape whether one chooses so or not. Better yet were the short bursts of speed required to run up the hill, follow the fence line and drop down into the small ravines. Out of breath one then picks up the bow which is ditched at random locations and makes the shoots with lungs still heaving and gasping for air. The red head lamp "duck hunting trick" had led me to my current position without being detected. So here I sat, back firmly planted against the huge tree. I knew it was wide enough to conceal even my bulky frame. The twinkling of distant stars brought some cheerfulness but little light, as the mountain ridge hid the delinquent sun's approach. All remained quiet for the next 45 minutes, no crows, crickets or drone of mosquitoes. caught off guard as the first thundering gobble. It seemed the tom was but 50 yards behind my left shoulder. These welcomed outbursts continued at roughly 5ive minutes intervals. Then came again On the other hand, even when using a blind the plea for attention from the opposite direction; then another elsewhere. I was in the money!



No blind nor decoys. I had decided to remain silent. It had been four years since I had used this strategy. Matter of fact, that had been my last successful longbow hunt. When the fan is deployed in full strut and tom's head is on the opposite side - this is THE time to slowly draw one's bow. As the tom glided to the ground he touched down just as if he'd read my unwritten script. Only 25 yards away he immediately began his strum - full flaps, and his tail feathers displayed a full fan. He angled into me, approaching my domain. Three steps, four, five - and then his circular dance began. It was interrupted as his right side presented itself. The shot was true and found its mark. The bird tumbled and flipped - then lay silent.



Sportsmanlike and lawful pursuit of free-ranging wild game in a manner which does not give the hunter an unfair or improper advantage over the animal is a simple definition of *Fair Chase*. So let's begin from there,.. how does one go about submitting an entry for CBH/SAA Big Game Club? The animal must first meet the *minimum score* for each individual species as listed by the Big Game Committee. It seems the best method to convey the rest of this information is to list it in a numerical manner. **Big Game Entry Requirements (Below)**

What's Up?

The heart of the Big Game Club is to maintain a recording system of Big Game harvested throughout our majestic state. At its core are fundamentals revolving around high standards of conduct and ethics in our lifestyle of hunting. This ethical code is necessary to protect our hunting's future, in addition to following all hunting laws and regulations. Adhering to the *Rules of Fair Chase* is required by all submitting an entry to our Club's Record keeping system.





- 1. Three photographs are required of antlers, horns, skulls, beard or tusks. This includes views from the front side, and a view from the left and right sides. Discrete Field honorable photos (tongues tucked in and no visible blood) are submitted at the highest resolution are preferred emailed and are best viewed if taken at a 45 degree angle.
- A drying period of 60 day minimum in normal room temperature and humidity are required for drying consistency. All flesh must be removed from antlers, horns, skulls, or tusks. Thirty (30) days for hogs -Turkeys may be measured the same day; the beard and legs must remain attached for a full score credit.

- 3. A completed **Harvest Report** with signed and witnessed **Affidavit**.
- The Harvest Report and signed Affidavit must be on the back side of the Official Score Sheet.
- 5. A \$10 Recording Fee (made payable to CBH/SAA Big Game Club).
- 6. The **Official Measurer** will collect all of the above and submit the completed application. The **Records Chairman** will check for completeness and verify the license, tag numbers, location, species and Fair Chase of the said animal. Once approved a **frame-able certificate** of harvest with the hunter's name and score is returned to the owner.



***Animals of higher caliber are encouraged to be originally **Committee Measured**

(three Measurers agreeing on each line item score and total at the same location and time). This will allow for the species to be recorded giving it the highest score credit towards the 2 (odd) year Awards Banquet. The top three of each species for that two year recording period qualify for additional awards. A measurers list (by county) with their contact information has been updated. Our new Mobile Clinic will soon roll out sporting our State logos and name. Roughly 15 people have signed up to go through our first clinics in the L. A. area. From there, the trailer will move north for training in the Fresno vicinity. Once done there we have another group requesting fundamental training to hone the skills necessary to become certified measurers by our state association.

It is vitally important to archive what California hunters have harvested over the years.

It is important to understand where we came from, who did what and when they accomplished what they did. Calling All Small Game Hunters!

Congratulations to Brandon Maynard! Brandon submitted his application, along with a picture, of his Desert Cottontail, from last year's harvest, to me for inclusion on his Small Game Species List. (See the attached picture)

July 1st kicks off the 2023/24 hunting season for us hunters in California. Did you know that there are 7 different species of rabbits in California? California's rabbit population include the following; Pygmy Rabbits, Brush Rabbits, Desert cottontail, Mountain Cottontail, Snowshoe hair, White-Tailed Jackrabbits, and Black-Tailed Jackrabbit.

A word of caution to those hunting "Brush Rabbits". There are eight (8) subspecies of Brush Rabbits in California. One of the subspecies, the "Riparian Brush Rabbit", was officially listed as "endangered" under the Endangered Species Act in 2000. Their population estimate is unknown, though the great decline in numbers can be attributed to a wide range of threats. They are found on the west coast from Oregon down to Mexico with the San Joaquin Valley holding a high percentage of them. Google "Riparian Brush Rabbits" to learn how to identify it and in what habitat it can be found.

Hunting rabbits with a bow has its challenges even if they are sitting still, at any distance. Depending on the terrain you may not get your arrow back, or in one piece. Using a type of blunt or a judo point on your arrow can help you locate your arrow and minimize damage to your arrow. If you like more of a challenge you can use a FLU FLU arrow. A FLU FLU will help your find your arrow.

There is an old saying that you should only hunt rabbits in the months that have an "R" in it. Those months are; SeptembeR, OctobeR, NovembeR, and DecembeR.

These months are typically coolder / freezing months. The cold / freezing temps will kill the weak and sick rabbits, and they are less likely to have worms. Either way, make sure the you are pursuing healthy rabbits. If a rabbit appears sick, do not touch it. Also, be sure to check your rabbits for worms or abnormal meat color, or has any abnormal smell, when cleaning your harvest..

July 1st through the end of January is rabbit season with a daily bag limit of five (5). Also, total in possession is only ten (10). However, you can harvest Jackrabbits year around with no limit.

Good luck to all of you that head outdoors this hunting season. Remember, take someone new to hunting, or a youngster, with you so they can learn about and enjoy this sport and the adventure.

1 Boned out Turkey Breast (roughly 4 lb.) 2 (10.5 oz) Cans Mushroom Soup

1 Packet Lipton Onion Dip Mix

1 c Forbidden Rice (dark purple to black - treasured nutty taste with antioxidants)

1lb. Mushrooms

1/2 c Water

1/4 c Wine

3 Tbsp Balsamic Vinger

3 Sliced Onion "rings"



Heat skillet to 325 degrees (cover surface with Avocado oil)

Grilled Garlic Rabbit

Submitted by Barr



Prep Time 5 mins, Cook time 25 min, Servings 4. Ingredients: 1 Rabbit or up to 3lbs. and 1 cup of salt-free garlic marinade (Mrs. Dash)

Directions:

- Wash and pat dry the rabbit pieces; place into a large resealable plastic bag. Pour in marinade and seal the bag. Turn the bag over several times to coat rabbit with marinade and allow to marinate in refrigerator 2 to 8 hours or overnight, turning occasionally.
- Preheat an outdoor grill for high heat and lightly oil the grate. Reduce to low. Remove rabbit from marinade and shake off excess liquid; discard the used marinade.
- Lay the rabbit pieces onto lower rack of grill. Grill until the rabbit shows good grill marks, the meat is no longer pink inside, and the juices run clear, 12 to 15 minutes per side. An instant-read meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part of a piece should read at least 160 degrees F (70 degrees C).

Catch the Big Bear Carp Roundup and the 18th Annual Clearlake Waterpig (Carp) tournaments too! See ads in this issue. With a little effort, you could be well on your way to a Golden Eagle Award....and uh...a JBarr speech!!

Hunting license sales have started, and you only have until June 2nd to get your draw choices in to DFW. 


